# Your gynaecological ultrasound scan

Important information for  
women attending for a  
transvaginal ultrasound

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**This leaflet is for women having a transvaginal (internal) ultrasound scan in the Royal Berkshire Hospital. Please read it carefully before you attend.**

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**Reminder:**

- No children in the scan room
- No mobile phone use in the scan room
- A chaperone can be arranged upon request

**Useful advice on the day of your scan**

- You do not need to have a full bladder for a scan.
- This is an internal scan, so the probe (known as a 'transducer') will be inserted like a tampon.
- The scan will be carried out by either a consultant gynaecologist (doctor) or a sonographer (specialist ultrasound expert).
- If you are latex sensitive please tell the doctor or sonographer before they start.
- An ultrasound scan uses high frequency sound waves to create an image of your pelvis. There are no known documented risks associated with this test.

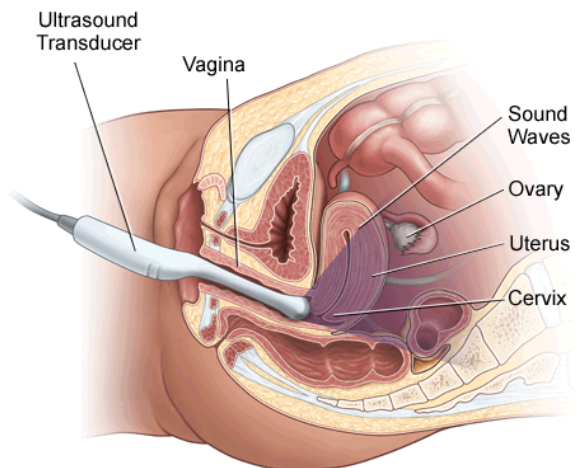
**How is the scan carried out?**

During the procedure, you will be asked to either lie on your back, or on your side with your knees drawn up towards your chest.

To perform the trans-vaginal ultrasound scan a sterile cover is placed on an ultrasound probe (not much wider than a finger).

This is then gently inserted into the vagina. The lights are then dimmed to allow the examiner to see the ultrasound monitor screen more clearly.

Internal examinations may cause a little discomfort, but shouldn't take very long – around 15 minutes.

### Important information

- If you would like to be chaperoned during the ultrasound examination please speak to a member of staff in the department.
- One adult only is allowed to accompany you – we are sorry that no children are permitted inside the scan room so please make suitable childcare arrangements in advance.
- All phones, tablets and electronic devices must be turned off while you are in the ultrasound room.
