Government launches 10 year plan for the NHS

The Government has launched its 10 Year Health Plan for England, setting out a bold, ambitious and necessary new course for the NHS.

The plan fundamentally reinvents our approach to healthcare so that we can guarantee the NHS will be there for all who need it for generations to come.

It has been shaped by the experiences and expectations of members of the public, patients, our partners and the health and care workforce across the country, reflecting he changes that people wanted to see.

Through the 'three shifts' – from hospital to community, from analogue to digital, and from treatment to prevention – we will personalise care, give more power to patients, and ensure that the best of the NHS is available to all.

Showcasing Innovation and Impact: A visit from Wes Streeting



In May, our CEO Steve McManus welcomed Wes Streeting, Secretary of State for Health and Social Care, to our Trust to see firsthand the innovative work underway.

A key highlight was a tour of our new Elective Recovery modular build, led by Consultant Urological Surgeon Sunil Kumar. Opening soon, this facility will increase our capacity with over 4,000 additional appointments annually, supporting services like Urology, Stoma, and Gynaecology.

Mr. Streeting also learned about the Genesis Study from Professor Mark Little. This groundbreaking trial uses a minimally invasive procedure to relieve knee osteoarthritis pain, potentially avoiding the need for replacement surgery. A patient who underwent the procedure years ago shared their continued success and improved quality of life.#

Finally, Ingrid Stracker showcased how we're transforming care with Point-of-Care ultrasound (POCUS). By equipping clinicians with portable devices, we're speeding up diagnosis, improving safety, and reaching patients not only in hospital but also in the community and their homes.

The visit was a proud moment for the Trust, highlighting how innovation is improving patient outcomes across services.

Trust's new Urology Outpatients Department

Next month is the official opening of the Trust's new, purpose-built Urology Outpatients Department - the Frederick Potts Unit. This state-of-the-art facility is the latest step in the Trust's commitment to improving care and reducing waiting times for patients.

Funded through NHS Capital for Targeted Investment in Elective Recovery, the unit will help address the backlog of elective procedures. The modern facility will be home to around 50 staff, caring for patients attending day-case procedures and outpatient appointments.

The new department boasts six consulting and examination rooms, a spacious treatment room, and a dedicated ultrasound scanning room. Additional facilities include a chemotherapy/treatment room, a lithotripter room for non-invasive kidney stone treatment, and a flexible laboratory space.

To ensure a smooth and supportive environment for both patients and staff, the building includes dedicated offices, a staff rest area, locker and changing facilities, and comfortable reception and waiting areas.

Trooper Potts was a Reading man who was awarded the Victoria Cross in 1915 for 'the most conspicuous bravery and devotion to a wounded comrade.' Whilst serving in the Gallipoli Peninsula, Trooper Potts, himself badly wounded, used his shovel as a sledge to drag a severely wounded colleague through enemy fire to safety.

Last month our Global Majority Network hosted their annual Cultural Celebration Event.

Sponsored by the Royal Berks Charity, the event was for all people across the Trust to highlight and celebrate, connect and learn about the wide range of cultures and backgrounds that make up our Trust family.

The cultural celebration is a peer-led event where colleagues had the opportunity to connect, learn, and celebrate our wonderfully diverse workforce from over 90 nations.

Avoiding patient deconditioning

Congratulations to two of our staff members, Oscar Amarille, Practice Educator in Specialist Medicine, and Dr. Rebecca Allfree from Elderly Care, who presented at the Global PJ Paralysis Summit earlier this month. Chosen by #End PJ Paralysis campaign co-creator Professor Brian Dolan, Oscar spoke



on "Continence Care and Deconditioning" and Rebecca on the "Power of Music,".

PJ Paralysis is a global movement encouraging hospital patients to get up, dressed, and moving to prevent <u>deconditioning</u> - a decline in physical and mental health caused by inactivity. Staying mobile, even with small actions like walking to the bathroom or sitting up for meals, helps patients retain strength, confidence, and independence, often leading to faster recovery and shorter hospital stays.

Families can support their loved ones in hospital by ensuring they have clothes, shoes, glasses, and hearing aids, and by encouraging light activity.

The Royal Berkshire Hospital also runs a Dress for Dignity scheme, offering emergency clothing for patients who weren't expecting to stay in hospital. We always welcome donations of clean, new or nearly new clothing - especially in small and XL sizes.

Please note that we do not have laundry facilities at the hospital, so clothes will need to be clean. There's more information on our website: <u>Get up, get dressed, get moving!</u>

Help Us Help Others: Return Unused Mobility Aids

The Royal Berkshire NHS Foundation Trust is asking the local community to return any unused mobility aids such as crutches or zimmer frames, to support patient recovery and reduce unnecessary costs.

Each year, we give thousands of mobility aids to patients, but most are never returned. Last year, only 38% of crutches and 15% of zimmer frames made it back to us. This results in the Trust spending up to £70,000 annually to replace lost equipment - money that could instead be spent improving healthcare services.

Returning borrowed items helps ensure future patients have quick access to essential support for their recovery.

Reading Urgent Care Centre has moved

The Urgent Care Centre service at Broad Street Mall in Reading has moved from the Broad Street Mall to the Royal Berkshire Hospital.

The Reading Urgent Care Centre is open every day from 10am to 10pm and is located in the hospital's South Block on Addington Road.

Patients who need same day care will be referred by RBH Emergency Department, NHS 111 and local GP practices.

Your Right to Choose NHS Care

Did you know you have a legal right to choose where you receive NHS treatment? When your GP refers you for most physical or mental health services, you can pick any hospital or clinic - as long as it's clinically appropriate.

This includes private hospitals if they provide services to the NHS, and it does not cost the NHS any more than a referral to a standard NHS hospital.

If your wait will exceed the NHS maximum, you can request to be referred elsewhere for quicker care.



You can also choose your consultant or healthcare team. Your healthcare provider will usually present you with options at referral, and you can find information to help decide, like waiting times and quality ratings on the NHS website.

Get hospital-level care at home



Our Virtual Hospital Service offers safe, specialist care in the comfort of your home - helping patients avoid hospital stays, recover faster, and stay closely monitored.

Using advanced technology, we track vital signs like oxygen levels, heart rate, and

blood pressure in real time. This allows our healthcare team to respond quickly, either remotely or with a home visit.

Once enrolled, patients receive all the necessary equipment such as monitoring devices, and have regular check-ins tailored to their condition. Support is available every step of the way for patients and their loved ones.

We offer a range of virtual care pathways:

- Respiratory care (for example pneumonia, COVID-19)
- Cardiology (for example heart failure, atrial fibrillation)
- Renal care (kidney conditions)
- Complex infections (for example septic arthritis, serious UTIs)
- General medicine

Our goal is simple: to deliver safe, effective care where patients feel most at ease - at home. And help patients recover faster and reduce unnecessary time in hospital.

Governor Article: John Bagshaw, Public Governor: West Berkshire & Borders



I have been a public governor for the Trust for almost nine years, and when I hit that milestone, I will have to stand down. This will be a sad occasion, as I have thoroughly enjoyed the experience and it has been extremely enlightening and informative. When I started, the Trust had been through a difficult time, and had recently appointed a new Chair, Graham Sims, and a new Chief Executive, Steve McManus. Together they had focussed on forming a stable and committed Board, and by involving staff, this formed a strong spirit of engagement and involvement in

achieving excellent care for patients and support for each other. Initiatives such as the 'What Matters' programme which emphasised mutual respect, encouragement and ensured bullying or prejudice could be called out helped create a positive working environment. Governor involvement and consultation was enhanced and management were strongly encouraged to be visible and supportive of their teams.

One of the most important roles for governors is to appoint Non-Executive Directors (NEDs), whose job is to give support and keep oversight of the Board and to seek assurances that they are complying with regulations and acting in the best interests of patients and staff in delivering services for the NHS. We also appoint the Chair, and have recently done so as Graham came to the end of his term. We were able to appoint Oke Eleazu as the new Chair to take us forward. Involvement in these processes has been interesting and challenging, and I am sure the great team which will be running things once I have left will continue to build on the excellent reputation of the RBH.

Anyone (above 16) can be a public governor, and, if you have some time to spare and are interested in having input into the provision of health care for your community, I recommend you investigate if there are vacancies for governors in your area. I shall remain a member of the Trust and follow developments with interest, now from the point of view of the Chair of my local surgery Patient Participation Group (PPG) as well as a sometime patient.
