
West Berkshire Breast Screening Service, 21A Craven Rd, Reading RG1 5LE

What to expect at the Breast Screening Assessment Clinic

Information for patients

West Berkshire Breast Screening Service

For some women, breast screening is a two-stage process and there is a variety of reasons why a woman may be asked to return for the secondary care assessment clinic. This leaflet explains what to expect during your visit to the Assessment Clinic.

Why do I have to come back for another breast screening?

There are a number of reasons why you need to come back; many of these reasons are not related to cancer. The clinician can discuss this with you if you need more information but we need to see you again for more tests to complete both stages of the screening process.

Do I have to come on that day – can I come a different day?

While we will try to fit in with your requests, the assessment clinics are held on a Monday and a Tuesday when all the specialists are available.

How long will the assessment appointment take?

We may need to take some more x-rays, carry out an examination and perform an ultrasound of your breasts. A small number

of women may need a core biopsy. We would suggest you allow 1–2 hours.

What is an ultrasound examination of the breasts?

This is a test using a probe and sound waves to check the breast tissue. The procedure is usually painless and is like the scan carried out on pregnant women.

What is a core biopsy?

This is when a small sample of breast tissue is removed and sent for testing. This is done using either ultrasound or mammography and a local anaesthetic is used to numb the area. You can find more information in our leaflets called '<u>Ultrasound guided core biopsy</u>' or 'X-ray guided core biopsy'.

Who will I see at the clinic?

You will see some, or all of the assessment team. The team consists of a consultant radiologist, a consultant radiographer, a radiographer and clinical nurse specialists.

How soon will I know the results?

Where possible, you will be given the results of the tests before you leave the clinic. If a biopsy is performed, the results will be available within approximately seven days and you will be offered an appointment to come back to talk about your results.
