

Myopia (short sightedness) and vaginal birth

This statement from the Royal Berkshire NHS Foundation Trust's Department of Ophthalmology (Eye Department) relates to myopia (short sightedness) and vaginal delivery and explains current UK practice. This may differ from practice in other European countries.

There is no medical evidence to suggest that a vaginal birth will damage your sight in any way, even if you are significantly short-sighted. Vaginal birth does not put you at increased risk of retinal detachment, even if you have had previous retinal detachment surgery or laser treatment.

You do not need to be referred to the Ophthalmic (Eye) Department for further assessment.
