






Fasting instructions for afternoon surgery

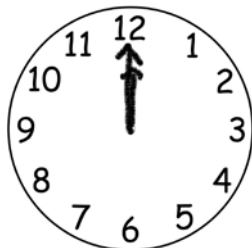
Information for patients at Prince
Charles Eye Unit, Windsor

Date of operation:

On the morning of your operation and before going into hospital:

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> – You can eat until 7.00am on the morning of your surgery. – Take your medication of
	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> – You can have clear fluids until 11.00am on the morning of your surgery. – Clear fluids include: water, black tea and black coffee (no sugar or sweeteners), watery squash but not fruit juice. – We recommend you do have a drink of water at 11.00am.
	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> – Do not suck sweets or chew gum on the day of your operations.
	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> – It is a good idea to take a bath or a shower before coming into hospital.
	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> – Remember to pack the following items into a bag ready to bring in: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> – Hospital information / letters – Tablets in their original packets – Dressing gown and slippers – Eye glasses

Going into hospital

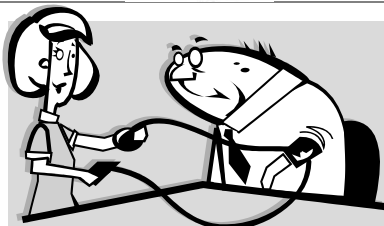


- You need to arrive at the Eye Ward at King Edward VII Hospital in Windsor by 12.00noon.

Before your operation



- On arrival at the ward, you will be shown to a lounge or ward.
- If you are having a general anaesthetic, you will be asked to change into a gown.



- The nurse will check your blood pressure, temperature and pulse (and blood sugar if you are diabetic).

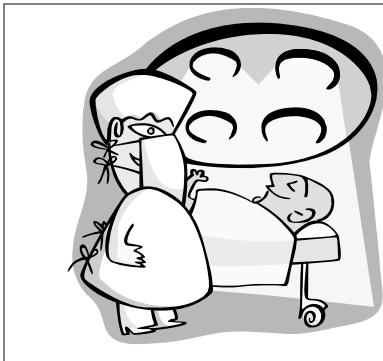


- You may have drops put into your eye before surgery.



- The surgeon will look at your eye and will ask you to sign a consent form
- Feel free to ask any questions or discuss any worries you may have with the surgeon or the nurse on the ward.

Having the operation



- You will then be taken to the operating theatre where you will be given your anaesthetic.

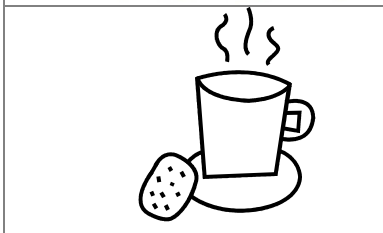
After the operation



- After the operation you will be taken back to the lounge or ward to recover. There you will be monitored by the ward nurses.



- A nurse or doctor will check you are ok and will look at your eye.






- You will be offered something to eat and drink when you are recovered enough.



- A nurse will bathe your eye and put drops in.
- A nurse will talk to you about caring for your eye after leaving hospital.

Going home

	<ul style="list-style-type: none">– You will need to put drops in to your eye until your next clinic appointment with the doctor.
	<ul style="list-style-type: none">– A nurse will give you all the instructions about how to care for your eye before you go home.– This will include advice about when you can bathe/shower, recommence exercise and activities, and return to work.
	<ul style="list-style-type: none">– You will be told at your next eye clinic appointment when to see your optician for new glasses.
