Advice following excision of pilonidal sinus

Adult Day Surgery Unit

What is pilonidal sinus?

- Pilonidal sinus is a long-term infection due to a reaction to in-growing hairs in the skin in the buttock crease area.
- The sinus is a cavity below the skin that connects to the surface with one or more small openings. It is a common disorder that occurs most frequently between puberty and the age of 40.
- It is more common in overweight people and those with thick body hair.

After the operation

- Your pilonidal sinus has been excised (cut out) and left open.
- Your wound has been packed with a special dressing to allow the wound to heal. You have a dry pad over the wound to absorb any discharge.
- Your dressing will need to be changed daily by the practice nurse at your GP's surgery. Your practice nurse will advise you on who will change the dressing when the surgery is closed, e.g. weekends and bank holidays.
- You will be given a letter and wound dressings to take with you when you first have your dressing changed.
- An appointment has been made for you on _____ at _____ with your district/practice nurse. Please arrange further daily appointments with the nurse.
- Please take a bath prior to your daily dressings change to ensure easy removal of the pack.
- It is normal to experience some pain and discomfort after your operation and while the wound is healing. You should take regular painkillers (such as Paracetamol or Ibuprofen) to help relieve your pain.

- Do not drive for three to five days as the operation may have affected your reflexes. Check with your motor insurance company before driving a vehicle.
- You should stay off work for _____
- You may need to refrain from work for longer than this, depending on the healing process. Please make an appointment with your GP if this needs to be reviewed.
- Avoid vigorous exercise/activity for four to six weeks.

Preventing further infections

- To help prevent your sinus from recurring, please keep the skin in the buttock crease clean and free of hair. This can be achieved by regular shaving of the area. Once the wound has healed, a hair removal product may be used.

Maintain a healthy well-balanced diet and avoid excessive weight gain.

If there is anything you do not understand or if you have any questions or concerns, please feel free to discuss them with your nurse.

During the first 24 hours following your discharge
