

The Renal Social Workers

The renal social workers work within the team of doctors, nurses, dietitians, pharmacist and psychologist who are involved in your care.

They work with people before they come to dialysis, dialysis patients and those who have had a kidney transplant.

They meet patients and their families at home, on the renal unit and in the hospital wards. They are aware that having someone with kidney failure in the family affects everyone and are here to offer support to all family members and carers.

The renal social workers can give advice and support on a range of personal, emotional and practical matters. They offer help on a variety of issues including:

- Benefits and finances
- Grants from charities
- Referral to occupational therapists for aids and adaptations
- Liaison with housing departments
- Hospital discharge planning
- Help at home, meals on wheels
- Emergency alarm systems
- Holiday grants
- Residential and nursing homes.

Living with kidney failure does present challenges and problems. It can be helpful to talk with someone from the renal team about this. The renal social work service offers you and your family that opportunity.
